African-American Museum of Church History Sunday, January 17, 2010, 4:00 pm DCPC Congregation House, 218 Concord Road

During the years immediately following the Civil War, many African-American churches in the south were estab-

lished by ex-slaves to create communities and worship in culturally distinct ways. Some of the African-American churches in our area, including Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church (est. 1868) on Neck Road in Huntersville, were founded at this time. Mt. Olive Church is currently spearheading a project to restore and convert a 1916 house across the street to be the **African-American Museum of Church History**. The museum will interpret the 141 year history of Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church as well as the history of other African-American churches.



Pearlie Borders, museum project director and member of Mt. Olive Church, will share the plans for this special museum and discuss some of the history that will be included in the museum.

DHS is pleased to partner with Davidson College Presbyterian Church to present this program.

Tour of Ephraim Alexander McAuley House Sunday, February 21, 2010, 2:00 pm 14335 Huntersville-Concord Road, Huntersville



Built in 1881, the McAuley farmhouse is one of seven two-story log houses identified in Mecklenburg county, and the only one erected after the Civil War. The house was remodeled and expanded to the rear in 1914 by John Ellis McAuley, an important local builder and the son of Ephraim Alexander McAuley. The house retains its original I-house form and much of its interior woodwork. The house was moved in 2003 from Alexanderana Road to its current location.

Stewart Gray, preservation planner with the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Historic Landmarks Commission and DHS Board Member, will lead us on a tour of the home and discuss the renovations currently being done by the Historic Landmarks Commission.

Tour of Cedar Grove - Members only

Cedar Grove, c 1831, was the plantation manor house of James Galbraith Torrance, whose 3,000 acre farm was one of Mecklenburg's largest. The home has remained in the Torrance family ever since.

Belle Banks will host the tour of her home. She and her late husband, Dick Banks, a Torrance descendent, moved into the home in 1948 and restored it room by room over the years.

Davidson History on the Web

Have you discovered "Around the D?" Launched in January 2009 by Davidson College archivist Jan Blodgett, this blog features documents, artifacts and interesting views related to the history of Davidson College and the town. The meanings of Davidson Street names, town movie theatres, the Watts dormitory fire of 1921, the history of the Carolina Inn, and Davidson College basketball uniforms over time are just a small sampling of the topics detailed in this fascinating blog.

"Around the D" seemed the logical name for a blog dedicated to exploring bits of Davidson history and lore. According to the blog's first entry, the phrase is more than shorthand for Davidson College. It originally referred to a path that generations of Davidson students walked on and along regularly. In 1868, a contest was organized by a mathematics professor requiring each class to draw a curve on campus. The students in the class of 1869 came up with winning calculations. Their curve ran from Main Street to the main campus building and back to Main Street behind the old chapel building. In the next few years, students planted trees along the path. The "D" was later incorporated in the campus design made by landscape architect John Nolen in 1915 and remained a part of the campus for the next 50 years. By 1960, the original D was lost as new buildings altered the pathways on campus and the area in front of the Chambers Building became known as "front campus." Still, the phrase "see you around the D" remained popular with students and alumni as it came to represent the college as a whole.
